

# **AMHI Approved DHS Brass Codes:**

Updated 2018

**402- Community Education and Prevention-** Activities designed to educate the public about mental health and co-occurring issues. The goals are to increase the understanding of mental health, reduce stigma, promote recovery, increase awareness of the availability of resources and services, and improve skills in dealing with mental health issues.

**403- Adult Client Outreach-**Activities within the community and segregated settings designed to locate and engage potentially eligible adults, inform them of available mental health services, and assure that they have access to those services.

**408- Adult Outpatient Diagnostic Assessment/Psychological Testing/Explanation of Findings.** Diagnostic assessment psychological testing and explanation of findings as defined in Minnesota Administrative Rule parts 9505.0370 to 9505.0372 by a qualified mental health professional.

**416- Transportation-**Travel (escorted or unescorted) to and from sites such as employment, stores, services, and medical and non-medical appointments to maintain or assist in recovery. This might include transit cards, mileage reimbursement, and taxis.

**418- Goods or services purchased to meet basic physical or medical needs.** Examples include medications, clothing, auto repair, and food. Entities must have a written policy regarding the use of client flex funds. **Note:** *If housing-related, use 443x Housing Subsidy. If transportation-related, use 416x Transportation.*

**420- Peer Support Services Non-clinical,** recovery-focused activities encouraging empowerment, self-determination, and decision-making provided by a Certified Peer Specialist.

**431- Adult Mobile Crisis Services-**Face-to-face services for of an adult who may be experiencing a mental health crisis or a mental health emergency. These services include crisis assessment, intervention, and community (non-residential) stabilization. This code covers infrastructure development such as training, as well as ancillary and supportive services. **Note:** *This service is distinct from development of a wellness plan (434X) and Adult Residential Crisis Stabilization (436X)*

**434- Community Support Program Services-** Services, linked to a support plan, provided to an individual at the location of their choice in order to stay in the community. Examples are grocery shopping, social activities, housekeeping, and the creation of a wellness plan.

**436- Adult Residential Crisis Stabilization-** Individualized services to assist the individual returning to their community. This service is provided following a mental health crisis assessment and intervention and as part of the treatment plan for this crisis. This code is used for residential services only.

**437- Supported Employment and Individualized Placement and Support Service-** Person centered support provided to persons with a serious mental illness to locate and maintain competitive employment in the community. This cannot be used for center-based employment.

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**438- Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) Intensive**-ACT is an intensive, comprehensive, non-residential rehabilitative mental health service that uses a team approach. ACT services are (a) provided by multidisciplinary, qualified staff who have the capacity to provide most mental health services necessary to meet the person's needs, using a total team approach; (b) directed to persons with a serious mental illness who require intensive services; and (c) offered on a time-unlimited basis and available 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, 365 days per year. This service must meet standards specified in Minnesota Statutes, section 256B.0622

**443- Housing Subsidy**-Direct payments for rent, utility costs, deposits on housing and utilities; household furnishings and supplies; or storage and moving costs.

**446- Basic Living/Social Skills and Community Intervention**- Basic living/social skills and community intervention services provided to rehabilitate and enable the recipient to develop and enhance psychiatric stability, social competencies, personal and emotional adjustment, and independent living and community skills, including Adult Rehabilitative Mental Health Services (ARMHS) and other rehabilitative treatments. **Note:** *Medication education should be reported as 454x Adult Outpatient Medication Management.*

**451- Emergency Response Services**-Response services available on a 24-hour, seven-day-a-week basis for persons having a psychiatric crisis, a mental health crisis, or emergency. Emergency response services include. **Note:** *Face-to-face crisis services should be coded under 431x or 432x*

**452- Adult Outpatient Psychotherapy**- Psychotherapy provided by or under the clinical supervision of a mental health professional to an adult with mental illness. This service is provided outside of an inpatient or residential setting and excludes psychotherapeutic services provided as part of a day treatment.

**454- Adult Outpatient Medication Management Prescription, medication education and review** for an adult as a means of controlling or eliminating severe behavior problems, or the effects of mental illness. This excludes medication management services provided as part of a day treatment, community support program, and services provided by staff of a residential or inpatient program.

**468- Adult Day Treatment** -A time-limited, structured program of group psychotherapy, rehabilitative mental health, and other intensive therapeutic services provided by a multi-disciplinary team to reduce the effects of mental illness, promote recovery, and enable transition to a lower level of care in the community.

**469- Partial Hospitalization**- A time-limited structured outpatient program of psychotherapy and other therapeutic services that is provided by a qualifying hospital or community mental health center. Services must comply with Minnesota Administrative Rule parts 9505.0370 to 9505.0372.

**474- Intensive Residential Treatment Services (IRTS)**- IRTS are delivered by an enrolled Minnesota Health Care Program (MHCP). Eligible recipients of IRTS are in need of a more restrictive setting to reduce the risk of significant functional deterioration. IRTS are designed to develop and enhance: psychiatric stability, personal and emotional adjustment, self-sufficiency, and skills to live in a more independent setting

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**491-Adult Rule 79 Targeted Case Management**-Services designed to help persons gain access to needed medical, social, educational, vocational, financial and other necessary services as they relate to the person's mental health needs. Services must comply with the Minnesota Comprehensive Adult Mental Health Act, Minnesota Statutes, Section 245.462.

**493-Adult General Case Management** A systematic process of ongoing assessment, planning, referral, service coordination, and monitoring, consultation and advocacy through which multiple service needs of clients are addressed.
